DEATH FROM CONVULSIONS.

The second inquiry was held at the Polytechnic, Thornton Heath, at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, touching the death of **Lord Oswald Clarke**, aged 11 months, whose parents reside at 27, Olivergrove, South Norwood.—The mother stated that the child had been very healthy from birth, but had lately had some trouble with its teeth. On Wednesday night it cried a little. The following day the child's thumbs seemed drawn, and witness's little boy came to her saying that the child was dying, and her daughter brought the child down. Witness then noticed that its legs were twitching and sent for a doctor, but it expired before medical aid arrived.—Dr. Pinkerton, of South Norwood Hill, gave evidence to the effect that upon examination he found that death was due to convulsions.—The jury returned a verdict accordingly.

Death took place during a fit, before the arrival of a medical man.—Dr. Pinkerton, of South Norwood, having stated that the cause of death was convulsions, the jury returned a verdict accordingly.
